Mr. Hecko said teachers must be proud of what they do and this pay increase is wholly deserving of their immeasurable services to the nation.

Meanwhile, care taker Chairman of the TSC, Jerry Kuhena, praised the TSC, PNGTA, DPM and the government for addressing the teachers' pay issue, saying that many teachers leave teaching due to the low salary conditions.

Mr. Kuhena said, this increase will assist the TSC in holding on to teachers and hopefully it will bring back teachers who have left teaching.

He said there are currently 46, 000 plus teachers, and the country still needs more than eight thousand teachers.

The increases is expected to be paid to teachers by the middle of May once, the pay system is updated with the new increases

The Minister for Education Honourable, James Marape would like to inform the public about the focus of the new RESI (Rehabilitation of Existing School Infrastructure) Project.

The Minister said that the National Government has allocated K70 million for the project but said, the funding allocated was not enough to meet all the needs of all the schools.

Mr. Marape explained that there is a need to prioritise activities and the Ministry and Department of Education, have decided to rehabilitate 30 high schools.

He said the Education Department has also come up with the criteria that will be used to select the 30 schools and they are as follows:

i) A school that is offering Grade nine (9) and ten (10), ii) a school that has not received any support from the old RESI Program, iii) a school that has secured counterpart funding from its to rehabilitate the Grades 9 and 10 local Member of Parliament, iv) a Provincial High Schools. school that is planned for in the provincial plan to be converted into a secondary school, v) a school that has not received any support from either District Services Improvement Program


inister for Education, Honorable. James Marape, MP has assured the World Bank that the two projects funded by them will be implemented successfully.

Mr. Marape made this assurance while speaking at the one-day workshop and launch of the two projects - READ PNG and FODE at the Gateway Hotel on April 19.

Mr. Marape said that since the education reforms in 1995, education has achieved a lot even though many people are saying otherwise.

Mr. Marape said that despite these achievements, there are challenges that the Department and the Ministry as a whole face as they come.

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Mr. Marape told the workshop that the READ PNG project will complement the Government's Policy on Universal Basic Education.

"We will feel the full impact of UBE in 2015, however, we must plan ahead for the large number of students to go into FODE," the Minister said.

He urged the implementing division to use the funding for FODE to make FODE lively and the best option for the vast majority of students who come out of Grades 8, 10 and 12.

Their titles are: Flexible Open and Distance Education (FODE) Project, 2011-2015 and Reading Education (READ PNG) Project, 2011-2013.

READ PNG project has four components also and K51.9 million as a grant from the World Bank was given to implement those components.

These two significant projects were officially agreed to by the Government of PNG and the World Bank in March this year.

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Acting Secretary wants parents and students to choose from the many pathways in education and training

any students throughout the country have completed Grade 8, 10 and 12 and will find themselves at the crossroad.

Some students will continue to Grades 9 & 10, 11 & 12 or tertiary institutions after graduation.

Not all students will continue to complete their education in the formal education system and many will find themselves making choices to other pathways.

The Acting Secretary for Education Dr. Joseph Pagelio said students should not take it upon themselves that they are failures nor should parents blame students for their incompetency which has led them (students) to missing out in the formal system.

"There are many pathways to take to acquire relevant skills training and or to move into the conventional stream.

Flexible Open and Distance Education (FODE) provides students with the opportunity to up-grade their academic grades and continue with their education in Grade 12," said Dr. Pagelio.

Distance education is a means of delivering education to people who cannot attend an educational institution on a full-time basis.

This can be offered through FODE and its Centres in the provinces.

At FODE, students study at their own pace and time, and the advantage is that they have the opportunity to sit the national examinations in Grade 10 and 12 just like students in the education system schools and can still progress to university and other tertiary institutions.

The Acting Secretary added that there are also many private institutions and some universities that provide distance courses, but FODE is one of the recipients of government funding for the provision of distance education which should be utilised.

Dr. Pagelio said that through FODE's twenty-one (21) provincial centres they do cater for two (2) types of stu-

dents:

i) Those who wish to upgrade their level of attainment in subjects in Grade 10 that include; English, Mathematics (Formal and Practical), Science, Social Science and Commerce, and receive a letter of attainment and,

 ii) Those who successfully complete all subjects for a grade and receive a certificate.

Students can upgrade their academic results by enrolling with FODE as it provides alternative opportunities to students to pursue their studies.

It has the potential to reach a wider audience at a lower cost and is open to learners who wish to receive Grade 7 – 12 education and persons undertaking technical and vocational training courses.

The same education is also open to adult citizens.

FODE is also developing adult education through literacy programs, short technical and vocational orientated courses taking advantage of advances made in information communication technology which will be delivered at its Provincial Centres.

There are 147 vocational training centres throughout the country that provide full-time courses for those who have completed Grade 6 - 12.

Students should make use of these opportunities and seek advice from the schools and institutions that are available and within their reach so that they can get enrolled on those courses.

Another avenue that students and also the members of the community can choose to continue their education or acquire skills training is the Community College.

There are 16 community colleges around the country which are offering various courses.

He wished all the students who have continued in 2011 all the best in their studies and encouraged those who will pursue other means of education and training to be productive and self-reliant in their communities.

Pagelio: Not wise to stream **Grade 9 students**

The Acting Secretary for Education, Dr. Joseph Pagelio is calling on the principals of all the secondary schools in the country to re-examine their current practices in relation to streaming their students in Grade 9.

Dr. Pagelio made this call in response to a media article that appeared on The National, dated 31/3/11 alleging that some secondary schools in the education system are streaming the students in Grade 9.

The principals and teachers are reminded that the students at their schools should be offered seven (7) subjects out of the nine (9) subject fields. Out of the 7 subjects, three (3) subjects are required. They are; English, Mathematics and Personal Development for literacy and numeracy skills and integral development of a student wholistically.

The other four (4) subjects will come from the remaining subjects to ensure that there are seven (7) subjects for certification.

However, schools can offer all the subjects but as long as the schools have sufficient resources such as; teachers, learning resources, classrooms, etc.

Dr. Pagelio also cautioned the schools that as there are three required subjects that must be taught to the students in Grade 9, they should not be led to believe that streaming begins at that level and start the science and social science streaming at Grade 9.

"Streaming of students into humanities, science and technical/business pathways should begin in term two of Grade 11," Dr. Pagelio said.

He added that all subjects at lower secondary are general and schools are not encouraged to stream students at Grade 9, but must make available seven (7) subjects for the students to study.

Dr. Pagelio said the principals and their teachers should consult "Lower Secondary Implementation Handbook and Upper Secondary Implementation Handbook for further information and guidance on the secondary subjects.

He said for further clarifications and information, the principals of secondary schools may contact the Principal Curriculum & Assessment Officer -Secondary Level, Department of Education, Curriculum Development & Assessment Division, P.O. Box 446, Waigani, National Capital District.

Dr. Pagelio also called on parents to obtain more information from the same address if they wish to find out more about the subjects taught and assessment used at the secondary schools.

The main strength of the NHSS was bringing in students from various provinces or regions together and promoting national unity. These institutions also bridge the gap between grade 10 and University entrance as well as to provide a broad general education for a small group of academically able stu-

In a way the NHSs were schools of excellence.

In the past, 4 regional schools were established. These were Sogeri in Central (Southern), Kerevat in ENBP (NGI), Aiyura in EHP (Highlands) and Passam in ESP (Momase).

Currently, there are 6 national high schools with the inclusion of Port Moresby in NCD and Wawin in Morobe Province.

Auto suspension of teachers from payroll will affect 6,000

After numerous reminders from the Other reasons for the suspension are been forwarded to them already. Acting Secretary for Education, Dr. Joseph Pagelio to all the Provincial Education Advisers to fast track their teachers' resumption of duty summary sheets (RoDSS) to the Payroll and Related Services Branch (PARS) at Waigani, a dead line for auto suspension of teachers from the Payroll was instituted on Pay Day 20th April, 2011.

"This suspension will affect a total of 6,723 out of 44,328 teachers across the country which is about 15.2% of teachers from all sectors in the education system.

The reason for instituting the suspension is to stop those teachers who have not completed their RoDSS from receiving pays as they would not be performing duties.

as follows:

- i) The RoDSS may have been incorrectly completed;
- ii) The names on the Forms may have been quoted incorrectly;
- iii) The File Numbers may have been quoted incorrectly;
- iv) The Position Numbers may have been quoted incorrectly;
- v) One Position may have been occupied by more than one teacher; and
- vi) Teachers have not taken up their positions at all.

The Acting Secretary has urged the Provinces to check the list of teachers suspended from the Payroll that has

He also persuaded those officers who have resumed duties but did not complete the RoDSS to complete the forms, or check to see if the provinces have copies of the RoDSS and submit them to the Payroll and Related Services Branch (PARS) at Waigani as soon as possible through the facsimile or hand-deliver them by authorised Education officers.

Dr. Pagelio said individual teachers are discouraged from taking their own RoDSS forms to the Payroll and Related Services Branch.

He stressed that all the Provinces should co-operate and fast track this call to avoid unnecessary suspension of genuine officers from the payroll.

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Sacred heart receive OBE text books

^Чhe Sacred Heart Catholic Primary School in Hohola, National Capital District took delivery of their fourth supply of the Outcomes Based Education (OBE) textbooks from Oxford First Aid Supply Limited on Wednesday April 6.

The textbooks for their grade 5 classes is worth K80,000. As a token of appreciation and in recognition of the continued business relationship with the school, the company donated a computer set to the school.

Chairman of the Board of Management, Mr. Blaise Golu said that when he took office in 2008, he and the members embarked on a mission to make the school one of the best primary schools in NCD and the whole country.

"My board set out to plot the road to excellence. OBE textbooks for students was a priority list," said Mr. The school searched for a company who could provide OBE textbooks and they found Oxford First Aid Supply. The school purchase the first lot of textbooks in September 2008, two months before four classes of Grade 8s sat the final examinations. The books cost K38,000.

"These books really helped the Grade 8 students in their revision and many of our students did very well in the final examinations and continued in to further education," Mr. Golu said.

The following year, Sacred Heart Primary School spent a total of K66,000 to purchase textbooks for Grades 7 and 3 to ensure that two students shared a textbook for all 9 subjects.

In 2010, the school purchased textbooks from the same company at a cost of K54,000 for Grades 4 and 6. This year, the school spent K80,000 on textbooks for Grade 5.

"Altogether the school has spent more than K200,000 on textbooks to ensure that each child had a textbook to himself or herself," Mr. Golu said.

He said that OBE was here to stay and schools should be budgeting for more teaching and learning resources for students and teachers in order to make teaching and learning easier and better.

"As a result of our schools high academic performance, the demand for space in Grades 6, 7 and 8 is increasing. For this year alone, the student to teacher ratio for Grade 8 alone has exceeded the ration allowed by the Department of Education with classes reaching as high as one teacher to 50 students," said Mr Golu.

He added that as a result of this the Board decided to introduce an additional Grade 8 class on top of the four existing classes to allow for a more conducive learning for students.

Mr. Golu thanked Oxford First Aid for the business relationship since 2008.
